

## PRONOUN CASE

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The case of nouns and pronouns indicates how the words function in a sentence. Nouns and most pronouns have only two case forms: the plain form (school, everyone) and the possessive form (school's, everyone's). They present few if any problems to writers.

The pronouns *I*, *we*, *he*, *she*, *they*, and *who* have three different case forms: the subjective form, the objective form, and the possessive form. The pronouns *you* and *it* have one form for both the subjective and the objective case and a different form for the possessive case.
